## WHAT THIS CONFERENCE IS ABOUT

---



Perioperative nursing is a dynamic and complex specialty that spans the entire surgical journey, from preoperative preparation through to intraoperative care and postoperative recovery. Nurses working in this environment must combine clinical knowledge, technical skill, communication and situational awareness to ensure safe outcomes for patients undergoing surgery and its subsequent recovery.

Perioperative care relies on highly coordinated teamwork between nurses, surgeons, anaesthetists and support staff. When these systems function well, the surgical environment operates with remarkable precision. However, production pressure, burnout, fatigue, and communication breakdowns can impact this process, and unexpected clinical events may follow with consequences for both patients and staff.

Perioperative Nursing is not commonly taught in the undergraduate curricula. Ongoing professional development is therefore essential for nurses working in perioperative services, as well as all nurses who care for surgical patients who wish to better understand the experiences and risks their patients face throughout the surgical process. It will also provide valuable learning for any nurse who cares for patients during a surgical admission including (but not limited to) nurses who work in the Operating Suite, PACU, Endoscopy Unit, Cardiac Catheter Lab, Intensive Care/Cardiothoracic Unit, Day surgery, and/or surgical wards.

This conference explores the clinical realities of perioperative practice through evidence-based discussion, case histories and coronial findings. Participants will examine the role of human factors, leadership and professionalism in surgical teams, alongside key patient safety issues including retained surgical items, venous thromboembolism, perioperative hypothermia and staff fatigue and burnout. The program will also address the recognition and management of critical perioperative emergencies such as malignant hyperthermia, anaphylaxis and cardiopulmonary arrest, providing practical insights relevant to nurses across the perioperative pathway.

Suitable for both novice and experienced nurses, this conference will strengthen understanding of perioperative care, enhance clinical awareness and reinforce the critical role perioperative nurses play in safeguarding patients during surgery.

### Day 2: 18/05/2027 | Conference Day | Setting the Scene for the Conference

Morning Self-directed via the Online Library

This morning you have self-directed learning activities that equate to two hours of CPD. You can choose to complete these activities in the time allocated, or you may choose to complete them before the commencement of the conference or after its conclusion.

**Asleep on the Job: Can Night Shift Napping Provide Greater Safety for Both Staff and Patients?**

Fatigue presents an all-pervasive challenge to anyone who is engaged in shift work. While this affects all nurses, those who work on night duty have been shown to have the greatest risk of fatigue and cognitive impairment thus potentially posing a higher safety risk to themselves, the patients under their care and the wider community as nurses make their way home driving while drowsy.

This discussion paper challenges nurses, managers and organisations to take note of current research, ACORN guidelines and **work health and safety guidelines and start to change thinking and culture by looking at napping on night duty as a 'safety'** implementation for staff, patients and the wider community. Policies and procedures should be developed, and further research should be conducted into length and type of naps and subsequent positive and/or negative effects that may be reported by staff and health care facilities.

Review the Standard on Staffing and Guideline on Fatigue

As mentioned in the above Discussion paper, please now review the Australian College of Perioperative Nurses (ACORN) standard on staffing and guideline on fatigue.

1100 – 1230: Lunch Break

1230 – 1330: Teamwork Under Pressure: Professionalism in the Perioperative Environment Synopsis

The perioperative environment is fast paced and high pressured, requiring strong teamwork and professional communication to ensure safe patient care. Yet even small breakdowns in behaviour or communication can disrupt team dynamics and affect both staff morale and patient outcomes.

This session explores the behaviours that influence professionalism in the perioperative setting, including communication styles, confidentiality, social media use, workplace gossip and behaviours that undermine colleagues. Practical strategies will be discussed to strengthen professional conduct, patient safety, support respectful team interactions and create a more positive and effective perioperative workplace.

1330 – 1430: Leading in the workplace: Leadership in the Perioperative Environment

In the perioperative setting, leadership is not simply about hierarchy or job titles. Nurses influence team performance, communication and patient safety every day through their actions, decisions and interactions with colleagues.

This session explores leadership theories and examines how leadership behaviours, both positive and negative, affect the functioning of perioperative teams. Participants will gain insight into how effective leadership supports teamwork, strengthens communication and contributes to safer perioperative care.

1500 – 1600: Seeing the Whole Picture: Human Factors and Situational Awareness in Perioperative Practice

Safe perioperative care depends not only on technical skill but also on the ability of the surgical team to recognise risks, communicate effectively and maintain awareness of what is happening around them.

This session examines the role of human factors and situational awareness in perioperative communication and practice. Participants will explore how elements such as communication, teamwork, leadership, decision-making and environmental pressures influence clinical outcomes. Understanding these factors can help perioperative teams recognise potential risks earlier and respond more effectively to protect patient safety.

1600 – 1700: When Fatigue Becomes a Safety Issue in Perioperative Care

Fatigue is a common reality for many perioperative nurses working long hours, demanding workloads and on-call shifts. However, fatigue does more than affect how nurses feel, it directly influences cognitive performance, decision-making and patient safety.

This presentation examines the factors that contribute to fatigue in the perioperative environment and explores the impact of fatigue on clinical performance and team functioning. Understanding the risks associated with fatigue is an important step toward improving both staff wellbeing and safe patient care.

0800 – 0900: Unintentional Retained Surgical Items

An unintentional retained surgical item is considered a preventable occurrence, yet this continues to occur in perioperative practice. These incidents can have serious consequences for patients and significant professional implications for staff.

This session examines the prevalence of unintentional retained surgical items and explores the factors that contribute to these events. Participants will review evidence-based counting practices and system safeguards designed to strengthen perioperative processes and support safer surgical care.

0900 – 1000: Preventing VTE in Perioperative Patients: Bridging Guidelines and Practice

Venous thromboembolism is a preventable complication that can have serious consequences for surgical patients. Despite clear clinical guidelines, variations between recommended practice and what occurs in real-world settings can increase patient risk.

This presentation explores how VTE develops in perioperative patients and uses case histories to illustrate its impact. Strategies for prevention and early management will be discussed to support safer surgical outcomes.

1000 – 1030: Break

1030 – 1130: Perioperative Hypothermia Part 1: Recognition and Clinical Consequences

Maintaining normal body temperature during surgery is a critical component of safe perioperative care. Even small drops in temperature can lead to significant complications if inadvertent perioperative hypothermia is not recognised and managed promptly.

This session explores the occurrence of inadvertent perioperative hypothermia, why hypothermia develops during the surgical journey, and the clinical consequences that can follow. Strategies for early recognition and appropriate management will also be discussed.

1130 – 1230: Perioperative Hypothermia Part 2

This continued presentation will look at the difference between core and shell temperatures, review current temperature monitoring, and how patient temperature is monitored.

This standard will provide evidence-based guidance for the correct counting process.

### Anaphylaxis Guidelines

This self-directed session explores the Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists anaphylaxis guidelines and their application in clinical practice. Anaphylaxis is a time-critical emergency requiring rapid recognition, clear decision-making, and prompt intervention. This session reviews current recommendations, early identification of symptoms, first-line management, and ongoing care considerations across healthcare settings.



### Malignant Hyperthermia

This self-directed session provides an overview of malignant hyperthermia, a rare but life-threatening clinical emergency that requires immediate recognition and rapid intervention. Although uncommon, malignant hyperthermia can escalate quickly, making it essential for clinicians to understand the triggers, early warning signs, and urgent management priorities.

### 1230 – 1330: Lessons from Coronial Cases: Improving Perioperative Practice

Coronial investigations provide valuable insight into serious clinical incidents and the factors that contribute to adverse outcomes in healthcare.

This session examines case histories involving the perioperative environment, exploring what occurred and what can be learned with hindsight. By reviewing these cases, participants will gain a deeper understanding of how clinical decisions, systems and human factors influence patient safety and how these lessons can inform safer perioperative practice.

### 1330 – 1430: Case Histories from the Coronial Inquests Informing our Perioperative Practice

This presentation will look at case histories of incidents that have occurred in the perioperative environment with a view to learning in hindsight.

1430 – 1500: Break

### 1500 – 1600: Malignant Hyperthermia: Recognition and Emergency Management

Malignant hyperthermia is a rare but life-threatening event resulting from abnormal calcium release in skeletal muscle that may be triggered by some anaesthetic agents and/or drugs. Rapid recognition and prompt treatment are critical to preventing serious complications and death.

This session will examine the underlying physiology of malignant hyperthermia, its clinical presentation, and current approaches to recognition and management.



### 1600 – 1700: Perioperative Anaphylaxis: Recognition and Emergency Management

Although uncommon, anaphylaxis remains a potentially life-threatening emergency in the perioperative environment. These reactions can occur rapidly and require immediate recognition and coordinated team responses.

This session explores the pathophysiology of anaphylaxis and examines current evidence-based approaches to recognising, managing and responding to this critical event in the operating suite setting.

## Day 9: 25/05/2027 | Conference Day

### 0800 – 0900: Cardiac Arrest in the Operating Room: A Case-Based Approach

Cardiopulmonary arrest can occur at any stage of the perioperative journey and presents unique challenges within the operating room environment. While nurses are trained in basic and advanced life support, the circumstances surrounding cardiac arrest in operating suite can differ from other clinical settings.

This session explores the management of cardiac arrest in the perioperative setting through the examination of real case histories. Participants will gain insight into the complexities of recognising and responding to cardiac arrest and the importance of coordinated team response during these critical events.

0900 – 1000: Why Evidence Matters: Protecting Patients and Preventing Compassion Fatigue, Quiet Quitting and Empathetic Distress Syndrome  
Clinical decisions grounded in evidence support safer care and stronger professional confidence. When practice is inconsistent or not evidence-informed, it can create uncertainty, frustration and may contribute to compassion fatigue, quiet quitting and/or empathetic distress syndrome among nurses.

This session examines how evidence-based practice influences patient outcomes and professional wellbeing. Strategies to strengthen evidence-informed care and support nurses experiencing compassion fatigue, quiet quitting and empathetic distress syndrome will be discussed.

1000 – 1030: Break

1030 – 1130: Applying the Learning: Translating Knowledge into Practice

This session provides an opportunity to reflect on the key concepts explored throughout the conference and consider how they apply to everyday perioperative practice. Participants will be invited to ask questions, clarify ideas and discuss how the knowledge gained can support improvements in patient safety, teamwork and clinical decision-making within their own workplaces.

CPR Guidelines for Children

This self-directed session reviews current CPR guidelines for children and focuses on the timely recognition and management of paediatric cardiac arrest. While cardiac arrest in children is less common than in adults, it is often preceded by respiratory compromise or clinical deterioration, making early identification and intervention critical.
